The foundation stone of the original Roman Catholic Church in Bunbury was laid in 1919, the church opened two years later and was elevated to Cathedral status in 1954 when the Diocese of Bunbury was formed. A spire was added to the tower in 1967. Sadly, on 16 May 2005 disaster struck when a cyclone damaged the Cathedral beyond repair and it was demolished two months later. In July 2008 construction began on a new cathedral, which was completed and consecrated some two and a half years later.

Thanks to the generosity of Perth ringer Laith Reynolds, the new cathedral was supplied with a very fine ring of eight bells cast in Holland, with John Taylor & Co providing the bell fittings and bell frame design for a local Bunbury firm to fabricate. The bells were raised into the belfry in February 2012 and on 17 March, over 20 ringers made the journey from Perth and Rockingham to ring prior to a special St Patrick's Day Mass, at which the bells were formally commissioned by the Bishop of Bunbury. The resulting ring is delightfully pretty sounding and extremely user-friendly to ring. Read the account of the first peal on page 11.

The idea to ring a 16-bell peal in Perth with an all Aussie band is something which routinely came up in conversation time and time again but would never get organised. There had been an ANZAB peal on 16 bells in 2016 - it just qualified for the association with 7 resident ringers and 1 former resident ringer. I certainly believed we could muster a completely residential band and "one-up" Little Bob Sixteen, which was the method rung in 2016. The tricky bit was getting all the right ringers in the right place and at the right time to have a fighting chance. There is a finite number of ringers in Australia you can ask to attempt such a goal and so the first emails went out in January. It also doesn't help when the majority of ringers live nowhere near the only 16-bell tower in the country - happily most enjoy travel. In addition to attempting a peal at the Swan Tower I arranged peals at other towers in Western Australia to sweeten the attraction. Furthermore, a practice day on 16 bells was arranged to give us the best possible chance of scoring.

All the plans came together over six months - I had 19 ringers committed to travel to Perth, including 3 reserves! 5 peals were organised in total so everyone was going to get something out of the trip. The best thing of all would be the huge social that would come with the occasion as we really can go years without seeing friends from across the association. *James Perrins*

SATURDAY 26 APRIL


- · General ringing and quarter peals in the morning

This was followed by open ringing to celebrate the coronation of Te Arikinui Kuīni Ngā Wai Hono i te Pō on 5 Sept, the final day of the tangihanga (funeral) of her father, Kīngi Tūheitia, at Tūrangawaewae Marae. Included was 27 rounds of Queens -Ngā Wai Hono i te Pō is the current youngest monarch at age 27.

We're back in the Auckland Heritage Festival 2024, with an open day on Sunday 13 Oct. We'll be showing visitors around the tower, demonstrating ringing, and giving visitors an opportunity to chime a bell. We're fairly limited by the dimensions of the tower, so get around 50 people up the tower and had 200-300 people through the church during our previous open days. Ropesight Day

On Saturday 3 Aug ringers from Orange and Bathurst came together for a highly successful Ropesight Day, meticulously organised and led by Jim Woolford (*Right demonstrating technique*). Jim's profound expertise offered a thorough exploration of the theory behind call changes, various ringing methods, and the fundamentals of ropesight, also underscoring the critical importance of ringing technique.



The event was further enriched by the presence of several experienced ringers including Rob McCalary, Oriana Zanon, Jared Bignall, Claire O'Mahony and Joy Fabry. Their diverse perspectives and practical insights added valuable depth to the learning experience.

Held at Bathurst Tower, the day was attended by approximately 15 participants. A notable highlight was the chance to test the new sound system, which received enthusiastic feedback for



its clarity and enhanced auditory experience. This upgrade greatly contributed to the day's ringing sessions, allowing a much more accurate assessment of technique and striking.

The practical ringing sessions were a core component of the event.

Participants, especially those still developing their ropesight skills, benefitted greatly from observing proficient striking. This observational practice was instrumental in mastering essential techniques such as elimination and counting up and down through plain hunting. Jim and the other experienced ringers provided hands-on guidance, offering personalised tips and addressing specific queries from attendees.

After a fulfilling day of learning and practice, the group enjoyed a delightful lunch at the church bar. The sunny weather provided the perfect backdrop for a relaxing meal and an opportunity to socialise and reflect on the day's activities. ITALIAN NAVY IN DARWIN

On Sunday 14th July 2024, St Mary's Star of the Sea Cathedral Darwin had the privilege of welcoming and Confirming 13 young men and women from the Italian Navy Aircraft carrier Cavour. They were prepared by their Chaplain on the high seas and Confirmed with our community in Darwin. Knights and a Dame of Malta accompanied the procession.

In celebration of this Sacrament, the Darwin Bellringers were asked to ring at the conclusion of Mass. Rounds to Queens and Whittingtons were rung, before the Bellringers were invited to join in their celebrations and meet the Italian Armed Forces personnel. As the Bishop of the Diocese of Darwin described, "It was a heartfelt moment of grace for us all." The following day, the Australian Navy opened up their Larrakeyah base HMAS Coonawarra for their open day for the first time in 7 years. A group of the Darwin Bellringers and their families gathered for this exclusive event. Thanks to the generosity of the Italian Navy, the group had the privilege of going on board the Italian Aircraft carrier Cavour and receiving an incredible tour.

EMERGENCY EVACUATION II

In the July 2015 issue of Ringing Towers the St Mary's Cathedral bellringers reported their learnings from a medical emergency evacuation on 23 Apr 2015. We learned a lot of things that didn't go smoothly and we wanted our mistakes/unpreparedness not to be an issue for other towers. We even wrote our account in The Ringing World. We had talks with the Cathedral authorities about "next time" - not that anyone wanted there to be a next time!

One of the biggest problems we had with the evacuation in 2015 was the hook above our trap door was not load tested. Some weeks later we found that the ceiling had been replaced around the hook so visible inspections could be made and hook load tested and tagged. In subsequent years they have kept this load testing up-to-date without any input from us.

The ringers themselves have also made sure that everyone knows of the procedures in case there is a medical emergency with updates all the time. Our procedures document is a "living" document and we have a laminated copy by the tower phone. We also have a "Next of Kin" document. This is not in case the worst happens, but if someone has to go to hospital for some reason then we know who to contact.

Unfortunately in June 2024 we had an accident in the tower towards the end of the practice when a ringing teacher was helping a learner and the learner lost control of the rope. The teacher went to remedy the situation but by pure bad luck got the rope wrapped around their waist and was tipped over, landing on their head and shoulder. "Stand" was shouted straight away, and seeing the look of the teacher's face, we called an ambulance, suspecting concussion. We knew where to send the ambulance (although we haven't got our "What3Words" sorted out yet - see below if you're not familiar with W3W) but they still did not go to where we wanted - they went to the front door of the Cathedral like last time.

Once we knew the emergency services were on their way two people went down to let them in and also contacted the Dean who opened the doors for the emergency services and turned on all the lights When the first medic arrived he said to some of the Police Rescue "oh, I was here about 10 years ago for a cardiac arrest".

The teacher / (now) patient was stable when the emergency services arrived but the obvious question was extraction. The 111 spiral stairs were very quickly ruled out, and as this wasn't our first rodeo we immediately showed the trap door under some carpet to the Police Rescue as well as the load tested hook for lowering. Furniture was moved, trap doors opened, along with safety fencing so no one would accidentally fall down. A couple more ringers went downstairs to move the pews for a clear landing. The Police Rescue and Ambulance team did their job and the patient was on terra firma within 90 minutes of the event.

As mentioned our evacuation procedure document is a "living" document, and we found a few things on the night either didn't go smoothly, or worked by luck - we've now updated information on keys and the tower address. This is where "What3Words" comes in - W3W is a system where three (seemingly random) words will give a 3m x 3m location. It's globally recognised and used by Australian emergency services.

Our tower landline phone has been misbehaving and crackling, meaning a mobile was used that night. This was mentioned to the Dean - by the time you read this report we strongly suspect our landline will be fixed by some sort of magic! We firmly believe that if a communication tool or extraction point is not working as intended then it needs to be raised with the church authorities, rather than waiting for an incident. It's not a bad thing to challenge the church authorities politely.

For a complex issue of extracting someone 30m above ground level we appreciate it's never going to be a straightforward exercise. But at least we know we operated as efficiently as we could, and we have learned from this incident as well. We hope that mentioning this to the wider community makes them think of safety and extraction on a regular basis in your tower.

A couple of quotes from the night:

We don't need to do an extraction every year, but we also need to make sure it's in 'living memory'- The Dean of the Cathedral.

I remember coming here 10 years ago for a cardiac arrest - Medic who knew the lay of the land, and we knew they knew.

CENTRAL COUNCIL 2024

The Central Council and Ringing World AGMs were held in Exeter on the weekend of 6 to 8 Sept. ANZAB Reps Peter Harrison and David Smith attended: Peter was on long service leave in the UK and David had been a tutor at the new North West residential course. Enid Roberts presented her apologies, though she was in communication the other reps before the AGM.

The weekend started with ringing opportunities on the way to Exeter and a social gathering *(right)* at a local Wetherspoons pub on Friday evening. Official business started on Saturday with presentations from the current workgroups, reorganised as everyone works towards "Ringing 2030" - an initiative started under Simon Linford's presidency and gathering steam under the current leadership of Tina Stoecklin (President) and Vicki Chapman (Deputy). 2030 has been set as a target for bringing about various

changes currently being planned. More details can be found at <u>https://cccbr.org.uk/ringing-2030/</u>. Essentially the intention is to tackle some of the difficulties facing ringing, many of which are found in our territory as well as the UK, though England currently has a particular problem with socially isolated towers that are declining or falling silent - exacerbated by Covid.

The approach is divided into three "pillars":

Publicity and Marketing: raising awareness of bellringing in society generally.

Recruitment and Development: developing local and regional structures to attract new ringers and regain lapsed ringers, and ensuring facilities exist for ringers to progress.

Quality environment: improving the teaching, leadership, ringing environments, safeguarding etc. so that ringers feel welcome and are retained.

Work has started in many of these areas - the workgroup reports gave details of current progress and future plans. All this requires more volunteers, and a more secure (and larger!) income stream for Central Council. This was the subject of the only mildly controversial motion at the CC AGM on the Saturday, namely to increase the fees. After some debate, the motion was passed (by a substantial majority, though with some votes against). Previously societies paid an amount depending on the number of representatives to which they are entitled, but CC subscriptions from 2023 have been on a per capita basis - currently 20 pence per annum, increasing to 40p for 2025 and then rising further to one pound the following year. At the meeting, the main arguments against this increase came (a) from university societies (many of whom do not charge a subscription, and whose members are probably the least able to afford even a small sum) and (b) from other societies that do not have subscription fees, and may find the administration tricky. However, even those who had reservations were largely in favour of raising more funds, but perhaps with rather more notice or at a slower rate; and the suggestion was made that university societies could apply for grants from CC if their situation really became too difficult financially, rather than creating exceptions.

In the debate, and at other times during the weekend, the point was made that current 2030 plans are still rather too vague and lacking in detail. While this is to some extent inevitable in these early days of the 2030 initiative, the Executive did take note of the criticism and undertook to improve things in this respect.

Much of the rest of the meeting was the usual reporting and routine business. In terms of elections, it is good that ANZAB is again represented on the CC Executive. David recently retired after two

terms, but the meeting elected Peter to the vacancy in the Executive created by the retirement of Clyde Whittaker. ANZAB really is one of the more effective of the territorial societies and has an important role to play in being involved with Central Council international ringing. The only other election was the re-appointment of the Treasurer Fergus Stracey.

As usual the Ringing World AGM was also held on the same day. Its financial situation is currently healthy, though it depends very heavily on donations

made to BellBoard, chiefly by ringers submitting quarter peals – so please will ANZAB members continue to be generous about this. This revenue has returned to pre-Covid levels, and has been further boosted by various royal events in recent years such as the "Ring for the King" initiative. However, no similar boosts are on the horizon, so RW's financial future is a cause for mild concern. It was noted that subscription rates are falling, though only slowly (almost entirely when existing subscribers pass away) - but few younger ringers are signing up. A report was also given on the very successful Ringing World National Youth Competition, which is growing in popularity.

One further event was the presentation of the Westley Awards for belfry maintenance. It was noted that while nominations were received from outside England for the first time this year, there were still no nominations from ANZAB or NAG!

Saturday evening saw a social event at the Topsham Brewery and Taproom, and on Sunday morning there was service ringing at various local churches, followed by a well-attended meeting where Tina Stoecklin gave a further progress report on Ringing 2030, and Simon Linford & Alison Hodge detailed their work on the dangers posed to ringing by the decline in church attendance and the resulting likelihood of churches becoming redundant. (While very interesting, not of such great relevance to ANZAB currently, but contact us if you want more information.)

Future AGM weekends are planned for Sheffield (5 to 7 Sept 2025) and Coventry (2026). David Smith





The HUNCHBACK of SYDNEY Accompanying the Wurlitzer

Bells at the end of the 1812 Overture has been done before. We had the chance in June to apply bells to a different form of entertainment and what a memorable experience it was.

The organist at St Andrew's Cathedral, Sydney, Ross Cobb and organist around Sydney town David Drury hatched a plan to recreate the days of the silent movie and the Wurlitzer. In the 1920s, silent movies were accompanied by music extemporised by the local pianist or organist to fit the ongoing storyline on the screen. For this performance, the choice of venue was St Andrew's Cathedral with its grand organ (Hill, refurbished by Letourneau in 1998) and the date June 1st (which turned out to be the wettest day in Sydney this year). The choice of movie was to be The Hunchback of Notre Dame (1923) starring Lon Chaney and Patsy Ruth Miller. This was the most successful silent film ever made by Universal Pictures, grossing \$3.5 million in 1923.

David Drury was the accompanist on the night with Ross as the stage manager. David had watched the movie 6 times during the previous week to familiarise himself with the story. Following a chance encounter with Tom Perrins at the Cathedral copying machine, Ross decided that, since bells were an integral part of the story, the Cathedral bells should be involved. So, at the last minute (4.30pm before a 6pm start) Ross and I went through the film and identified 6 intervals where bells should be sounded. These were of varying lengths up to one minute and requiring either one or two bells to be ringing.

Emily Perrins and Tim Hyman were available at short notice to help and the 10th and tenor were raised in anticipation. To increase the volume in the Cathedral, both doors to the belfry and the spiral staircase were left open.

Ross stage managed our contribution by phoning my mobile five seconds before each entry. Tim, a non-ringer (so far), timed the ringing and gave an appropriate signal when we should stop. Emily and I tolled on one or two bells as appropriate. This ad-hoc arrangement worked well though Ross had to apologise for an extra "pocket" call.

Apparently, at the first bell entry, the audience broke into laughter and applause on realising that the bell noise was in fact the real thing. At the conclusion of the performance (in which the organist excelled) both Drury and we were given standing ovations.

Following this, many of the assembled company took the opportunity to brave the spiral staircase and view the belfry and bells. We were delighted to enrol Sophie Brown as a new recruit to

ringing. She has proved to be an able learner and has made rapid progress, enough that she was able to ring at Prospect during a recent visit to South Australia.

Although only a small crowd had braved the weather for this extravaganza, it was an evening which both they and we will remember fondly. *Bill Perrins*

Sadly, despite several attempts to start a local band, a group of local ringers has not eventuated at Bunbury Cathedral. One of the main problems is the long distance from other WA towers disrupting the possibility of regular teaching and practice.

Without a cathedral band the bells have not been rung often enough for the local residents to get used to hearing them on a regular basis. It was therefore prudent to leave thoughts of the first peal on the bells for a reasonable time. 

Andrew Bolton Died 23 August 2024, aged 83 years

I remember Andrew Bolton as a dynamic & enthusiastic member of the ringing team at St Paul's Cathedral Melbourne. Andrew learned to ring in Newburn, Northumberland and Newcastle Upon Tyne and became a College Youth. An electrical engineer, he and his wife Shirley moved to Melbourne for work in 1965. They were a welcome addition to the ringers at St Paul's Cathedral and soon made their presence felt. Shirley was an avid knitter and ringer. Andrew brought his enthusiasm for ringing, and in particular, conducting Stedman Caters, to a team that was still mourning the departure of his predecessors, Philip Gray and George Pipe.

They and 2 other local ringers joined the visitors in a peal of Kent Treble Bob Maximus, the first peal of Maximus rung outside the UK.

Andrew rang 48 peals, including 7 for ANZAB in methods ranging up to Stedman Caters, Cambridge Royal and Kent Maximus. Bellboard records 230 quarter peals rung by Andrew, but this will be an underestimation of quarters rung early in his ringing career.

In the 1990s the Boltons moved to South Africa where Andrew was a founder member of Transvaal Society of Church Bell Ringers in Johannesburg, South Africa, and tower captain of the (then) new ring at St George's, Parktown. Later they returned to the UK, ringing regularly at Kingston-on-Thames. We extend our sympathy to Shirley, and to his sons Robert and Darren. David Heyes



Lewis Prince

3 April 1940 - 6 July 2024

Lewis Prince was born in Walsall, Staffordshire and learned to ring when he was at university in Edinburgh - at St Mary's Cathedral. Lewis married Margaret in 1965. They lived in Great Easton, Leicestershire and later at St. Andrews, Scotland. He may not have done much ringing during that time, but in 1975 he moved with his family to Christchurch, New Zealand




where he became a regular member at St. Paul's Papanui and also rang at the cathedral. In 1979 the Prince family moved again, this time to Papua New Guinea, causing an inevitable break from ringing. The break ended in 1981 when they moved again - this time permanently - to Hobart.

From 1981 to 2023 Lewis was a loyal and much-loved member of the Hobart band, serving as treasurer for the St. David's ringers throughout that time. His other contribution to Hobart ringing came in the form of his two daughters, who rang with us until careers and family took them elsewhere. Lewis rang ten peals, all but one in Hobart, in methods ranging from Plain Bob Minor to Cambridge Major. Bellboard records 128 quarter peals. He was not known for making mistakes during these performances. Lewis will be remembered for his cheeky sense of humour and his colourful - and willingly offered - opinions on absolutely anything. Kent is a method where you can easily predict where bells will be - it was this structure which kept the ringing strong.
